

Executive summary

We are pleased to share our findings in the California Insights Review for 2023. From July to October 2023, we surveyed over 300 policymakers in the state about their policy priorities and the top issues facing their communities.


Cost of living is the top concern for California policymakers in 2023, with over 40 percent of policy staff identifying the lack of affordability in the state as a major issue. Additionally, this concern is cited as an underlying contributor to several of the other main priorities for California's policy leaders – housing, crime and public safety, and taxation. Both parties highlight the inability of many working families to afford rent or purchase a home. This, in turn, can exacerbate homelessness and its perceived connection to increased criminal activity. These themes, according to policymakers, all tie back to Californians struggling with the rising cost of living and needs to be addressed urgently.

This report is the fourth in a series that examines four of California policymakers' top priorities, which include (i) cost of living and housing (ii) crime and public safety (iii) taxation and (iv) environment and climate.

Taxation

In 2023, California saw one of the largest budget deficits in the history of the state. After months of lower-than-average tax revenues, the shortfall has forced lawmakers to consider enacting substantial spending cuts to balance the state's budget. At the same time, California policy leaders - 16 percent - emphasized that taxation is a top policy concern.

Policymakers cite specific concerns about high taxes in the state and highlight the need to find solutions that allow California businesses and communities to prosper. Some policy leaders say that taxation in the state is so much of an issue that they are concerned it is driving opportunities away.

Policy leaders highlight that high taxes are a prominent issue in California.



I do believe that we live in a state that is extremely taxed on everything that we do, whether it's gas or whether it's anything at the store. I mean, when I started working, I was making \$8 an hour as a minimum wage. And now hearing that the minimum wage is \$15. And fast food workers are going up to \$20 an hour and healthcare workers are at 25. Well, those bills aren't seen as a tax but it's going to make things more expensive.
